#### RSVP NOW!

Does this button look familiar? If you have ever responded to an event, you know this button. But did you know there is more to pushing it than meets the eye? Well, let us tell you all about the RSVP button, particularly when it comes to including "guests."

- 1. What's ORCA's Guest policy?
- 2. When I RSVP for an ORCA meetup, why can I add Guests to some but not others?
- 3. How do I add a Guest (or Guests)?
- 4. Who can be a Guest at an ORCA event?

Here are the answers:

- 1. ORCA doesn't have a specific policy about Guests. That answers the first question. However, a Guest should be a guest and not an ORCA member. Read on.
- 2. ORCA's Event Hosts, the community volunteers who put ORCA events on meetup, decide whether to let attendees invite Guests to each event. They can turn on or off an "Allow Guests" setting to allow Guests for that event. They can also set the Guest limit. That's all handled by the volunteer Event Host. By default, the setting to allow Guests is turned off. Sometimes that setting is left off unintentionally. So, it pays to message the host to see if they really meant "no guests." That answers the second question.
- 3. When the Host enables the 'Allow Guests' setting in the Meetup settings, you'll see a 'Bringing Guests?' option right next to the RSVP button. If you don't see that option, then the Host hasn't opted in to allow Guests for that specific event.

If you want to bring a Guest and you DO see that option, just input the number of Guests. If you DON'T see that option to add Guests when you RSVP but still want to bring a Guest, just message the Host directly through Meetup. Be patient for the Host to reply and respect their decision. That answers the third question.

4. Quite simply, "Guests" are non-members of ORCA. So, if you are RSVPing for yourself, that's fine. If your "guest" is a member, they should RSVP for themselves. I know this might seem foolish, but we need to know how many members are attending which events. Otherwise, it screws up our numbers. This is particularly important when we are asked how many active members we have and do they participate in events. Therefore, we encourage ALL ORCA members to always RSVP as individuals and not as guests in order to be counted in attendance and as participants at our events.

Here are a few reasons why the suggestion above is the best practice:

- A. ORCA counts attendance and participation statistics for its members. This information is crucial for obtaining grants and forming partnerships. If our "active member count" is underestimated, it could negatively impact our funding efforts and advocacy success.
- B. Members who don't RSVP on their own but rely on others to mark them as "Guests" don't count in our membership level for events and participation. Only members who RSVP factor into ORCA's "active member" statistics.
- C. Members who don't RSVP but show up or come as a "Guest" appear as "inactive" in ORCA. "Inactive members" could miss out on future messages or newsletters from ORCA about upcoming events and meetings.
- D. Guest attendees don't receive any reminders or alerts from Meetup about the events, so they wouldn't be notified of any changes to the meetup event. It is very beneficial for ALL members to RSVP to receive the reminders and alerts from meetup.
- E. ORCA Event Hosts can't identify or communicate with Guests about the events. Only members get such communications.
- F. Guests are essentially "invisible" and "anonymous", and attending ORCA members who RSVP can't see any profile information for the members who get added on as Guests. Plus, those who come as Guests miss out on messaging between RSVP'd members before, during, or after the event. All reasons to never add an ORCA member as a Guest.
- G. Calendar updates, event location changes, or event cancellations ONLY go to the members who RSVP and not to Guests. There is NO contact with

Guests. Therefore, a member who is added on as a guest will not receive any communications about the event.

- H. Whenever ORCA events reach attendance limit and have a "Waitlist," only the individual ORCA members who'd RSVP'd get moved over from the Waitlist to attend the event if space becomes available. If there is only one space that opens up and your guest is also a member, there is no space for that member in the event. You will have to decide which of you gets to go.
- I. Event Hosts rely primarily on member RSVPs, not Guest counts, to gauge the interest level of the event. That's another reason why every ORCA member who attends events should RSVP. It gives us an accurate account of member's interest in an event.
- J. Meetup members should RSVP for events because it helps Event Hosts plan for the right number of people, make sure there's enough space, and have enough resources for ORCA members who are coming. It's a way to show that you're committed to attending an event and respecting the Event Host and other ORCA attendees.

K. Also, guests are friendly people who want to accompany ORCA members at ORCA events, but only if the Event Host says it's okay. Every ORCA member is encouraged to add Guests who will share our values to our event experiences. However, it's BEST practice not to ever add someone who's already a joined member of ORCA in meetup and part of the ORCA family to the attendance list as a "guest."



## Screening of the Lesbian film "The Whistle" ABQ Queer Women's Meetup



The ABQ Queer Women's MeetUp invites WOMEN to attend the March 8th (Saturday) afternoon film screening of "The Whistle." **The screening starts at 1pm at the Erna Ferguson Library, 3700 San Mateo Blvd. NE.** 

The history of the LGBTQ community is often told in big, bold strokes. That's not the case in *The Whistle*, a documentary feature crowd funded and directed by StormMiguel Florez, a 45 year old Xicane trans man, who returned to his hometown in search of the origin of a secret code he learned when he identified as a young dyke in the 1980s.

By focusing on the queer history of his hometown of Albuquerque, New Mexico, during the 1970s and 1980s, this queer Chicanx trans man is intent on giving

voice to the oft-forgotten stories of the local, LGBTQ community. In this case, the doc takes the filmmaker back to the time when he came out as and identified as a lesbian in 1987 — during his freshman year at Del Norte High School in Albuquerque.

During that time, several of his lesbian peers took him under their wings and taught him how to navigate the stresses and joys of being gay in Albuquerque in the mid 1980s. They took him to house parties, introduced him to lesbians from other high schools, cruised the parking lots of gay bars that they were too young to get into, and taught him slang like "wrecked" (the process of coming out ) and "1-4-3" (code for "I love you"). And, as the title suggests, they taught him "the dyke whistle."


#### These Stories Are The Best! They Slam!!


We will be meeting prior to the concert for a quick bite at **Frontiers Restaurant** on the corner of Central and Cornell across from the campus.

Decades before indie labels were the norm, and years before women had any real access to the industry, Cris Williamson was busy changing the face of popular music. In 1975, the twenty-something former schoolteacher recorded *The Changer and the Changed*, for her brainchild, Olivia Records. the first woman-owned woman-focused record company.

Her music and voice quickly became the soundtrack of a movement and was the cornerstone of what would become known as "women's music," music created, performed, and marketed specifically to women.

Today, that recording, *The Changer and the Changed*, remains one of the best-selling independent releases of all time. Says Bonnie Raitt, "The first time I heard Cris' music, it was like hearing honey dripped on a cello... Cris has been a whole lot of women's heroes—including mine."


